Reciprocal Lending Arrangement (RLA)

Allows libraries to share content with other libraries without joining a consortium

Library maintains its own individual, unique OverDrive collection in Libby

RLA mimics inter-library loan





Commonwealth e-book program was replaced and previously licensed content from Axis 360 assimilated into OverDrive Collection








Patron User Experience
